## COMPUTER CHESS. NEWS SHEET 5

Greetings to all readers, 'new' and 'old' alike; regulars will be able to tell that the electric typewriter still hasn't had repairs completed, but the Duplicator is back in action so I am hammering away on the borrowed portable again:

As I am currently conducting Tournament Level Matches between MEPHISTO AMSTERDAM, SCICIS TURBO KASPAROV and FIDELITY ELEGANCE game—scores from same take precedence this time. For those of you who prefer more of the NEWS and COMMENT style, I apologise, knowing that I shall have to leave some items over till next time.

## HISTORY OF CHESS COMPUTERS.

I have recently been reading an article in a USA Magazine on the above subject and it has been most interesting. Although not said directly various comments made amount to this - 'We have seriously over-rated Chess Computers in the past. Now they have really arrived' (how often have you heard that?) 'we can admit it'. Various playing strength figures are given for some of the pre-1980 favourites which provide some shocks for any folk who still thought those early Machines were Chess PLAYERS when really they just knew the moves - at least most of them did!

It: is good to be reminded of past overconfidence, but the steady flow of their Results in Tournaments against humans make it increasingly clear that they really are a force to be reckoned with now. Past issues of the News Sheet have referred to strong performances by FIDELITY and SCICYS Machines at the US Championship and NOVAG at the French Open. Further results coming in from MEPHISTO, NOVAG and SCICYS and referred to in the News Sections following show that the 'attack' is continuing well! And now that the programmers are improving the positional evaluation techniques and selective search is working properly I believe the future is bright.

## MICPHISTO

It seems right to start with the World Micro Champion, the AMSTERDAM, especially as it has been busy proving its ability to a wider field since the World Championship. Results against humans in Tournaments now

include the following:-

5/9 at Montpellier, France in a Tournament. running as a 'side-attraction' to the Candidates. A strong field and 2 Masters (2200+) beaten.

72/12 at Wiesbaden, West Germany.

9/10 in a Speed Tournament in Helsinki. Strong opposition again. At the end FIDE Master Harri Hurme makes a speech on Chess Computers, pointing out their weaknesses, but embarrassingly proceeds to lose his exhibition game against the Amsterdam:

9/9 at Alabama, USA. Obviously it came first, the 1st. Computer victory against mortals under normal Tournament conditions as far as I know. Victims included 5 players rated over 2000.

# SCICIS

The standard TURBO KASPAROV version's score of 6½/12 at the US Open was referred to in NS/3 with its Elo Rating of 2100+. One of the losers (Jerry Hanken, 2253) has (courageously) allowed his defeat to be published in an American Magazine with notes which are both amusing and serious. A well-worth reading Article if you come across it.

Whilst under the SCICYS heading, let me tell you their latest news:-

The TURBOSTAR has been 'sharpened up' slightly and its price reduced to £195. The KASPAROV Opening Hodule can be added for an extra £60 approx. Following my early Test. Matches with this Machine, kindly loaned to me by SciSys, I have concluded that this is the best of the Opening Books - it is wide but deep (36000 positions) but contains some sharp lines often putting the Turbostar into an advantage. By contrast I have come to the conclusion that the CB16 Cartridge I have in my ELECANCE, whilst being very helpful to an: owner who wants to train himself in a wide variet of openings, does not improve the Elegance's performance as much as I had thought. In America they advertise the CB16 as adding only 25 Elo (didn't know this when I wrote the last NS) and I think they may be right. Perhaps the CB9 (narrower but deeper) does more for a Fidelity's performance.

It is hard to make too many comparisons between the TURBO KASPAROV and the LEPHISTO

ANSTERDAM because of the wide price difference. On the basis of a Playing Strength/ Cost ratio the Scicys Machine will take some beating. But I have to admit I was a little disappointed with the lack of functions for Analysis/Hint help which is something which I am keen on myself for the benefit of my own Chess progress. But there is an excellent choice range for Levels of use and the simple dark grey/light grey board and men are easy to see and work with though in no way comparing to the super styling and wood felted pieces on the Mephisto unit which I have (their 'middle' quality, the Exclusive S goodness knows what their BEST one must be like:). The play style etc. readers can judge for themselves from the Games at the end of the News Sheet.

2 other Scicys items concern their 2 new Machines. It is the same programme, one in a table-top board running at 12mhz and Rating around 1850. Called TURBO 16k it will cost £90. The 8mhz version is a battery, plug-in travel (or sat-up-in-bed unit called EXPRESS 16k and costing £60.

#### NOVAG

The main Novag News must concern the CONST EXPERT's terrific performance in the Well-known King's Head Quickplay. Time allowed is 30 mins for full game and the EXPERT, set at 15 secs per move, scored 4/6 getting a 2128 rating. Being a Speed

I believe that Novag have a SUPER CONST-ELLATION and EXPERT in with the BCF at present for their endorsement/approval, which they will surely get. I also hear that Novag plan to make some improvements to the Super Constellation board and functions and put the Expert programme in it, still at 4mhz, for around £250.

#### CONCHESS

I haven't heard from CCC since my last
News Sheet so remain uncertain about a

contestant. Has any reader had a copy of
their 'Chess Computers Today' Magazine since
the September issue? I know of one other

free like my effort, we're hoping they come
soon.

#### BRITISH CHESS LAGAZINE

I was disappointed to see the BCH extract a brief critical comment from my December MS/3 and a longer piece of critical writing from the Sept issue of the ICCA Journal as their full contribution of comment on Choss Computers in their Feb. 1986 issue, especially as both publications spend 95% of their time highlighting the good and enjoyable things in this field. Of course it may be fun to write about such things rather than print, say, a copy of the 1985 World Micro Table, or give the game-score of a Chess Computer victory in one of the Tournaments I have mentioned against the 'superior' human opposition. There are so many good things to enjoy about the fast-advancing Chess Computer (not least the advertising revenue such as BCL get from the Manufacturers/ Distributors!?) and, as time goes by, all Chess mags. vill find themselves, even if reluctantly, having to include more and kinder comment about the Computer opposition.

Please forgive me, BCM, and thanks for the various reader enquiries which you've had and passed on to me! My renewal subscription enclosed!

The first 7 games were covered in NS/4 to the point where MA led 5-2. From here MA proceeded to win the next 6 (!) games on the run and highlights follow.

Interestingly (and sadly, I think) MA wont voluntarily play the King's Gambit as White. Nevertheless his 'Book' for the defence as Black proves to outlast the CB16 in this variation.

This suddenly steps out of the draw mode. If these were humans you would think that MA's decision to play on had unsettled the Elegance as his position deteriorates beyond all recognition. That is not to take away credit from the MA which plays destructively.

The game finished here as obviously won for the MA.

2 things happened during this Game. Firstly I realised that I would never be fully happy with my Elogance again (unless it was strongly up-gradeable) and that I would have to have an Amsterdam of my own. Secondly the Scicys Turbo Kasparov arrived in the post so that I could give the Elegance a break from its current thrashing.

Game 1 was won by MA as Black after 89 moves and we join game 2 with MA now as White and after his move 36 g4

MA assesses this position in his favour at +1.36 being a Pawn up; but with opposite coloured Bishops the game has been a tight positional struggle. Here MA expects the reply 36 - h5

36 - Kh6? 37 g5+1 (2.00)

I think this is a fine breakthrough coming as it does from almost nowhere. 37 Kh5 38 Be6!

Another good blow threatening 39 Bg4 mate 38 - Rf5

What else?

39 Bxf5 gxf5 40 Re6 Rb6

An excellent move: 36 a5 (+0.72) looks strong but TK has Nd2 37 Rxb1 Nxb1 and some hope. After 36 Rb4: however, if Nd2 MA has Bxd2 which leave his R under the Bishop's protection.

It is worth commenting here on how wide, deep and sharp the Kasparov Opening Book is - almost always outlasting both Mephisto and the CB16 and more than 50% of the time with some advantage. Also how often the Amsterdam, though out of its Book, nevertheless finds Book moves. BCO calls the Dragon "razor-sharp and often violent", which just about sums-up the MA play in this game.

11 - Bb7\* 12 a3 e5 13 Be3 Be7 14 Kb1! Good. This is the right place for the King in this line according to BCO.

14 - 0-0 15 h4 Mh5 16 Qf2 Rc8

15 h4 is another strong move recommended once Black has castled. MA rating +0.76

After this game 9 was drawn in 100 moves, but TK won game 10 with Black in 76 to make the score 8-2 in the Amsterdam's favour. The first 3 games of this Match were long, drawn-out affairs with TK winning a Pawn in the 1st. and 3rd. games, playing Black, and winning in 81 and 102 moves respectively. The 2nd. game was drawn after repetition of moves at 76. The main advantage to me of these first games was the idea (brainwave?) of using the Ameterdam as a 'monitor' and getting it to assess the position every few moves to help me see more easily where particularly good or poor moves had been played. On the spot 'expert' analysis!

So we come to game 4 with The Turbo Kasp. leading  $2\frac{1}{2}$

Times TK 0:20 FE 0:49! FE spent over 10 mins determined to move his Queen and settling on Qg4. It is an active move - a typical Elegance preferance - but a bad move as TK quickly shows. MA chooses 14 - a6 when 15 Rad1 is -0.50

15 Nd5 Bxd4?

FE's 14th move undid him, but this is another error and he should have played Na5 (-0.45). FE seems to expect TK to 'play nicely' with some gentle exchanges on d4. Note, though, that TK also has 16 Nxc?! as well as the move played and this could proceed Rb8 17 Bxd4 and if Nxd4 18 Nxd4 and Rxd4 gets 19 Re8 mate

whilst 18 - Qxd4 19 Rad1! So FE must refuse the final exchange on d4 and is a piece down! TK's 16 h3 is not quite so good as Nxc7, bit it's strong enough to change the game to his favour.
