# CHESS COMPUTERS ----- NEWS SHEET 7

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Greetings to all readers, both new ones and regulars. It is good to be printing again after another 5-6 week period of testing, sorting and organising the large amounts of information which reach me each week. Many thanks to both Manufacturers and Readers who continually keep me in touch with whatever News they have for passing on to the NS readership which has now reached 80!

In fact this Issue should have been done using a Computer/Word-Processor and Daisywheel Printer attached thereto, but the supposed suppliers of what I wanted have let me down and the various equipment hasn't even arrived yet so I decided I would have to do this issue on existing type.writer and gear. Maybe next time, though I don't think the actual appearance will change so much, it is more the 'ease of publication' for myself.... I hope!

Well, it's time to get started. This issue is mainly a results and games issue, but I wish to start off (by popular DEMAND, with a brief look at what I consider the 'best buys' in 4 different price ranges. Quite a few readers have asked me to provide more details of prices to enable a Strength/Price comparison. I have resisted this until now as I believe there is more to the decision of 'What should I buy' than a simple strength/price ratio. Appearance, quality, reliability, functions, upgradeability are other major matters involved; nevertheless, when I hopefully get the whole News Sheet onto a Computer I should be able to simply 'call up' the current Rating List for immediate print-out onto stencil and I will try to alter the Program me for same to include the Data concerning prices where known. Perhaps Manufacturers can keep me up-to-date with their new Models and price changes from time to time in this respect to avoid too many appearing with a '?'.

## A NEWS SHEET 'Best Buy' Guide.

## UNDER £100 but over 1800 flo!

How quickly things change.... I have as many as 6 Machines now to recommend, all coming under this Heading. Readers should refer to the RATING LIST to obtain the current Mating for each Machine, but brief notes on prices are made here. NOVAG CONSTELLATION/3.6 has just had a price reduction to £98 (+£10 for adaptor) and easily beats the 1800 Elo minimum. A press-sensory board (press-sensory usually means a plastic-type surface and the user presses the square with his piece as the piece leaves the square and then presses the square on which he wants to put it. With Machines until a couple of years ago this sometimes required you to nearly press through to your dining room table, but the Novag, Fidelity and SciSys machines I have tested during the past 12 months have all been satisfied with gentle pressure and responded easily). Back to the CONSTELL-ATION/3.6.... press-sensory with good features and functions. The SUPER ENTERPRISE is similar in price and being press-sensory, has even more functions and can play in 4 different styles which means in some positions you can get it to seek out aggressive moves and then get it to produce a positional-type alternative (or use it on its 'normal' mode which is probably just its strongest all-round). It's Rating is a little below the Constellation/3.6. ADVANCED STAR CHESS is exactly the same programme/functions/speed etc. but is a small plug-in set with battery lasting ages and first class for travelling or sat up in bed! Cost is around £70. A

direct competitor to the Advanced Star Chess is the SCICYS EXPRESS 16K/8mhz which is also a plug-in and has good functions and appearance. Its cost is £60 but it may Ratera little lower than the Advanced Star Chess though, in fairness, I haven't had chance to try one out yet. However the Manufacturer's (SciSys have always seemed very fair in this area to me) suggest themselves around 1800 Elo. The Express 16K/8 has an 'elder brother' which is again similar to Const/3.6 and Super Enterprise in press-sensory style/functions and price It varies from the Express in its name TURSO 16K and runs at 12mhz so will be around 50 Elo better. SciSys indicate this at 1850 but, again I am lacking in any other games info here and if anyone can send me details of scores obtained by either of these I'd be glad. A final Machine under this heading is the MEPHISTO MONDIAL though I have a feeling it is priced at very slightly over £100 at about £110-£120. Particularly nice in appearance with good functions; tests with it in Sweden put it slightly below the Super Enterprise/Adv Star Chess Hating. .

#### FROM £100 to £250 and over 1900 Elo!

I would like to mention 5 Machines in this group - all are press-sensory again with 8x8 LED lights (ie, there isn't a light for each square but they are placed on the horizontal and vertical and you 'cross-reference' them to find the piece the Computer wishes to moves. As soon as you have pressed this it gives the cross reference of the destination square. I prefer the 'light for each square' system for simplicity in use,

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as long as they aren't so big as to become unsightly. However the 8x8 system is easier to get used to than you might think and some folk prefer it, not only because it enables the Manufacturer to keep the price down as with these and the Machines under £100, but also because it leaves the playing area 'cleam'). All these 5 Machines have good functions but I have made brief comment on a couple of points against each Machine. The SCICYS TURBO KASPAKOV is, I think, £260 rather than £250, but should come into this section because of press-sensory style and appearance. It has recently been the subject of my NS tests and has performed very creditably (see result details elsewhere). It plays a fine defensive game, also a strong end-game, very good openings and can play a strong attack when it sees an advantage. Its preference seems to be for closed styles, 1 d4 openings, it will often exchange down into an end-game to make full use of its ability there, but I would have liked to see it play a little more actively or sharply in quieter, equal positions. Also I must warn readers to watch where you put its feet! It stained one of my other boards after being left on it over-night! I would also like to have seen help/analysis features which (personal opinion) I believe are important to help the owner if he is hoping to use the Machine to advance his own play. Nevertheless there are no real grumbles at all with TURBO KASPAKOV, it's a good-value Machine. The NOVAG SUPER CONSTELLATION must be one of the best known and most-purchased Chess-Computers of all-time and hardly needs my endorsement! The USCF gave it an Official Rating of 2018 some time ago and it is a strong Machine in all areas of play with good functions and helps. Farhaps mest important of all is the news that Novaq has just reduced its price to £750 which does make it first class value. SCICYS has a second Machine in this group namely the TURBOSTAN 432 which was the TURBO KASPAHOV's predecessor. Virtually the same as the TUMBO K but with a smaller Openings Book and therefore with a lower Mating (and price, of course! at £195). Fimelly FIDELITY has the EXCELLENCE and here both the 3 and 4mhz models come well within the price limit and exceed the Flo Hating requirement. Perhaps I can say a word or two about the Excellence without too many folk jumping down my throat. When it first came out and on the basis of info. from the U.S.A I gave the Excellence a 2020 Mating. My subsequent mail from 4 or 5 sources had to be read to be believed for vitriol (no repeats, please) but 1 or 2 others also wrote helpfully and all felt I was substantially over-rating the Machine. On the basis of this and with a couple of (very) small sample Results, I reduced the Excellence/3 to 1930, noting that others still felt this to be too high and were suggesting under 1980. Now I don't know if the Excellence/3 that first came into the country and the Excellence/3 and 4 now being sold are exactly the same; whether the first few had a programme error or something I just don't know; but I do note that the Results currently coming in from various European sources (eq. see the Swedish Rating list later in this NS for a shock!) indicate that the Excellence is getting \*some very good results, especially considering its price of £150 for the 3mhz and £200 for the 4. Please don't misunderstand me..... I am not saying that the Excellence is necessarily a better buy than the 3 Machines already mentioned above... but I do think it should come into consideration in this Price/Rating range. I have received quite a few results for the

Excellence recently and, whilst I will not pretend that my original 2020 figure has proved right, I certainly believe I went too low when I dropped it to 1930 and regulars will not a steady climb up since then. Indeed the 2020 figure may well apply to the 4mhz version. Can I ask readers with Excellences.., please keep results coming to me and let's find out as near as we can what this range of Machines should be. Perhaps if you could advise re your date of purchase when sending results and I'll try to keep a track of that info. and see if it brings anything interesting up. Anyway, the Excellence is press-sensory with a small Openings Book but sharp in playing style and has good functions/helps.

#### FRDM £250 to £500 and over 2000 Elo.

In this section we are progressing to wooden boards and auto-sensory moving system (ie. you lift the piece and put it straight onto its new square as you would playing a human. LEDs are on every square and the Machine shows its move by flashing the from and to squares and you just move the piece for it. All in this range have good functions, the Elegance less than the others because it cannot replay a full game, and the Mephislo more in that its method of advising its analysis and rating of the position is built-in via its LED system when you open its draw (most Computers use the flashing LEDs on the board and a range of buttons on the side of the board to obtain function info., the Mephisto has a draw which you can keep closed or open up and info. is gained via that. The Novag and Fidelity machines require a Home Computer or Printer to obtain just a couple of its extra functions. NOVAG CONSTELLATION EXPERT is an improved programme based on the Super Constellation. Novag indicates that the Expert plays about 50 Elo above the Super C; some Readers have written me feeling the improvement is greater but from my tests I would rather stay around +50. A fine board, nice felted men; I would have personally preferred it if the hint mode could be switched on or off for a game's duration whereas you must press it (beep beep) every move to obtain a hint. Also forward analysis can only be obtained by moving the pieces though you can of course take them all back afterwards to continue from your base position. Otherwise its full marks for appearance, size (12%"x 12½" play surface), quality, functions etc. The cost is £430 which is good value for quality. The MEPHISIU MM2 scores similarly, certainly in the Mephisto midrange Exclusive S board. Cost is from £330+, but that is for the cheaper board, though it is still autosensory and has full functions. For the wood board at 13"x13" you need to pay a price similar to that of the Expert. The Openings Book is not so substantial at all as that in the Expert, but you can buy an extra Module to put this right, though that puts the price right on the edge of my £500 limit for this section, and to get the MMM2 in Mephisto's best quality board, the Munich, would go quite a bit beyond it. I have the Exclusive 5 Board with my Amsterdam (the MM2 owner can up-date to the Amsterdam, for £600 if he wishes and has a nice Bank Manager!) and it is a quality board as is the Expert. The Mephisto magnetics for the pieces are absolutely first-rate, especially in speed games when you want to put the pieces down quickly as the board seems to

recognise a piece's arrival however inaccurately you have planked it on its square. The pieces are not quite as large as those on the Expert but are again felted and represent a quality acquisition. The CONCLESS/4 and the FIDELITY ELEGANCE/3.6 are both being placed in this Section though I think both just miss out an the 2000 Elo Hating, though they come pretty close. Both make it on the price and the Elegance goes over 2000 if you buy a CB9 or CB16 Openings Book Cartridge for it, though you get a bit close to the £500 then! The Elegance is 10"x 4 10" Playing Surface and the pieces are equally smaller and not felted so the quality is not so good as the 2 previous Machines. The Conchess/4 is (like the Mephisto) available in 3 different Board qualities and prices go from around £490, then £460 approx. for the mediumsized wood board. Conchess may have a Machine which both fits into the Price and Strength bracket here in the PLYMATE/4... It cortainly makes it for Strength being the same Programme as that in the MEPHISTO MM2 referred to above. However I'm not sure how the prices work out; the cheaper board will be under £500 but I'm not sure if their medium-range one (ie. wood) is just under or

#### £500-£1250 and over 2100 Elo.

just over the £500.

The MEPHISTO AMSTERDAM is the only Machine which, to my knowledge, certainly qualifies on both accounts in this Section. Board style/size, functions etc arc exactly the same as for the MM2, it's 'just' a different Programme Cartridge operating, these being easily user-replaceable if/when you up-date). So quality is high again, but so is the price from around £900+ and just over £1000 if you want the wooden board of the Exclusive S. Quite a few of my NS Readers have the Amsterdams. Of these just 2 feel a Mating around 2150 may be more accurate. Most are around 2200-2250 which is the range

I would certainly go along with for this Machine. In the Swedish Mating List you will see they have it even higher but again I would be happier to stick with my own Kating List which already shows this to have a high ability. It's value in analysis and ability to give positional evaluations for 2nd, 3rd, 4th, best moves etc is, in my view, most appealing and useful and, in spite of its price, I cannot really recommend it too highly. FIDELITY has the AVANT GARDE programme in its top ELITE Board now. The 'standard' model runs at 5mhz and is below the 2100 but will be very close to that . with C89 or C816 Openings Book in bringing the price to around £750 (FIDELITY.... can you send me your current Price List for this, please, for my next NS?). 1 understand there is an AVANT GARDE/Bmhz available though perhaps just in U.S.A at present - and that would go over 2100 though the rumoured price in Chess Life, the U.S.A.Chess mag, is \$3000! The CONCHESS PLYMATE/omhz will again be just under 2100 and cannot be improved as this already contains its full Opening Book: Price guess is again £600 for the 'black and silver and £650 for the medium wood board... but these Figures are approximate as I haven't got Conchess's own figures on the Plymate range. Finally SCICYS are bringing out a LEONARDC which may well qualify on the 2100 Elo (that is the exact SciSys indication), but I don't think prices for same have been released yet. Rumours reach me from various sources (I should explain that the Leonardo is not a 'rumour' but denuine SciSys info) about up-coming new Machines 'as good as the Mophisto Amsterdam and cheaper' and various Headers have asked me about what I have heard. I can only say that I have heard the rumours! Apart from the info. from SciSys none of the actual Manufacturers or main Distributors has given me any indication as yet of any challenge with which they expect to dethrone the 1985 World Micro Champion ... Mophisto Amsterdam.

#### NEWS.

NOVAG has announced price reductions for some of their range; main details already given above, but I understand the new Novag out later this year will be called the FORTE. It's price will be £299 and its Strength could be even a little above the Expert's according to the advert.... 'the strongest Novag ever'.

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SCICYS has a SUFERSTAR 36K appearing in the Results Section (Swedish Results); I understand from them that it is a Turbostar 432 running at 2mhz, apparently available in European countries but not over here. It is stated as definitely not an up-grade of the Machine/Programme known as the Superstar in this country. The /URBO 16K (which I have at 1850 Elo but require owner's reports/opinions for if anyone can help) is also to be made available with a Kasparov Openings and Games Module and have some extra functions, but price not known yet. The LEONARDO which I referred to in the 'Over £500 and over 2100 Elo' Section is, in its highest Playing Strength form, to be the Turbo Kasparov increased to 48K with various extra Analysis and Evaluation Functions, running at 12mhz and called LEONARDO ANALYSI MODULE. Price unknown but the SeiSys indication of 2100+ in the latest info. I have from them could be a chort-selling of themselves. The Speed increase from 4mhz to 12mhz alone should put this around 2150-2175 which would be very good if it works out that way.

Fame for the NEWS SHEET! Hegener and Glaser kindly sent me photo-copies of part of the German Chess Computer Magazine 'Schach and Spiele' in which brief comment and a Rating Table from an earlier News Sheet was printed... 'world-wide recognition' was the comment made by them (but I am having the German translated to make sure it's pkay!!!). Seriously it was good to find these efforts are reaching so far, especially as I have a handful of readers both in Europe and Australasia and Africa!

Following the HOW MANY RESULTS ARE NEEDED Article in N5/6, another reader, Lawrence

Barlow kindly wrote me with a remarkable (to me!) binomial formula and full explanation for using it to calculate result probabilities. I haven't had chance to get to grips with it yet or put it into my own Computer, but Lawrence confirms that the correct formula as given bears out my published finding exactly. For those who may well be interested, here it is....

$$p^{n} + (n/1*p^{n-1}q) + (\frac{n(n-1)}{1*2}*p^{n-2}q^{2}) + (\frac{n(n-1)(n-2)}{1*2*3}*p^{n-3}q^{3}) + \dots q^{n}$$

Hope I've typed that out understandably - I should have stayed at school longer! p is the probability of an event having a certain outcome, q is the probability of its alternative, and n the number of trial games.

1984 RESULTS. Reader Costas Clita very kindly sent me some really useful information on various 1984 events, some of which I didn't have the scores for. I shall not re-produce them in the NS at this time, but I have included them in my Computations which explains why some of the Machine Ratings may have changed a little although no new scores are quoted for them in this lesue. Once I get everything into my 'new' Computer (here we go sgain!) then back-tracking over older scores should be much easier. I haven't actually gone back to the 'beginning' and re-worked all the Machines from scratch as I often do with 'older' results; however there were no major Rating alterations in that area so it wasn't necessary this time. Nevertheless, thanks for the help which was greatly appreciated.

It has been interesting to read of the interest in HiTech, most of which has seemed to come following the NS/5 Article in January. Each year there is the FREOKIN MASTERS INVITATIONAL TOURNAMENT held in which a small number of Main-Frame Computers are invited to compete with a selection of humans of similar/slightly higher Hatings. The Players of course, knowing of the Computers which will be present, are able to make appropriate preparations, and the Computers haven't always managed to live up to their Matings. The 1985 invite was to the HiTech on its own and the field chosen to oppose it deliberately set at a higher level and all of Master strength minimum (actually 2217-2404). HiTech came 3rd. in this field with  $5\frac{1}{2}/8$ , obtaining a 2437 Performance Figure!

According to the Report I have, the N.CONST EXPERT was running at 5mhz and all other Machines at their standard commercially available speeds. However there seems to have been some misconceptions about the Expert's speed which IS 4mhz in the commercial Machine and I frankly don't know if the Dutch report is correct or another of the misconceptions. It would only make a 3D Elo difference to the Expert's Performance figure anyway when you recalculate it back to 4mhz, but the above Table has assumed that it was at the commercial 4mhz.
